SUBJECT: Approval of the FY 2002-2003 Annual Action Plan

(A Resolution Approving the City of Urbana and Champaign/Urbana/ Champaign County HOME Consortium FY 2002-2003 Annual Action Plan)

Description

Included on the agenda of the April 22, 2002 City Council Committee of the Whole meeting is recommending to forward of the FY 2002-2003 Annual Action Plan (AAP) to Council for approval.

The AAP is a consolidated planning document describing the use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME) funds received by Urbana and the Champaign/Urbana/ Champaign County HOME Consortium.

The AAP must be submitted to Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) 45 days prior to July 1, 2002. This results in a May 17, 2002 deadline for submittal to HUD's Chicago Office.

At the April 8 Committee of the Whole meeting, Council determined it would not act on the FY 2002-2003 Annual Action Plan (AAP) until they had reviewed all other city budget concerns.

Further, Council tasked staff with the following:

- Review carryover activities to be sure of that progress is being made toward completing projects.
- Identify programs that have accessibility as a component of the program.
- Address typographical error in Neighborhood Organization Grant section.
- Modify adopting resolution by moving approval of Neighborhood Organization Grant from Section 3 to Section 4.

These matters have been addressed and details are provided herein.

Another major consideration related to the Annual Plan has been identified. This being the failure of staff to utilize the appropriate budget constraints in preparing the Public Service Activities section of the AAP. The total amount available for Public Service Activities is \$86,693, rather than \$99,485. This is a difference of \$12,792. Staff has provided recommended budget adjustments to address this error.

Issues

The issue before City Council is whether to approve the AAP for submittal to HUD. City Council authorization is necessary for the City and the Consortium to submit the AAP to HUD.

Background

The following is a summary of activities taken to address council tasks and staff adjustments.

Review Carry Over Activities

Staff had prepared a spreadsheet indicating the amount of carry over for each activity in the AAP and the activity's current level of carry over. This information can be included in the AAP, however, in previous years, carry over adjustments are made during the late summer amendment process in order to utilize year-end accounting.

Accessibility Programs

The programs that have a direct accessibility component are the Emergency Grant and Access Grant programs.

Typographical Error in NOG section of AAP

This had been corrected, changing two to "a", describing the program as singular.

<u>Modify Resolution by moving approval of Neighborhood Organization Grants from Section 3 to Section 4.</u>

The resolution has been modified and a copy is attached.

Public Service Cap Correction

This budget error was a function of using the value of program income for FY 2000-2001 rather than FY 2001-2002. Program income in FY 2000-2001 was \$124,000. This was significantly higher than that received and anticipated for FY 2001-2002 at \$38,955.

HUD provides that the maximum amount that can be spent on public service activities is 15% of the annual CDBG grant award and 15% of last year's program income. This amounts to public service spending cap of \$86,693.

The following are program adjustments to remain within the public service spending cap.

Transitional Housing Personnel reduction of \$4,726 can be accommodated by allowing HOME Program Delivery to fund this portion of salary. With the experience in managing the Transitional Housing Program, staff time can be directed to assisting with program delivery activities associated with the HOME funded activities such as Tenant Based Rent Assistance and Rehabilitation.

Transitional Housing Program/Operations reduction of \$4,000 can be accommodated by delaying some maintenance items. Staff is also hopeful that current year funding can address some maintenance items if no emergency maintenance concerns arise.

Neighborhood Clean-Up reduction of \$5,000 can likely be accommodated with the planned reduction in clean-up activities. Limiting participants to 1 load of junk and debris should limit the volume of trash and subsequent program costs.

Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation reduction of \$4,726 can be accommodated and will not impact funding necessary to leverage Federal Home Loan Bank application for additional funds. Also, staff is applying for additional "Get the Lead Out" funding from the Illinois Department of Public Health.

Un-Programmed Funding in the amount of \$13,726 is a result of reducing the public service funding by this amount to meet spending cap requirements. This funding can be distributed now or during the amendment process in August /September. Staff believes that the later distribution is more effective way of identifying projects for additional funding.

HOME Program Delivery increase of \$4,726 can be accommodated and will reflect allocation of staff work activities.

Options

Options for Council action include the following:

- 1. Approve the FY 2002-2003 AAP, including recent staff adjustments, and forward the Resolution to Council for approval.
- 2. Approve the FY 2002-2003 AAP, with other changes to be inserted into the document and forward the Resolution to Council for approval.
- 3. Do not approve the FY 2002-2003 AAP and task staff with activities necessary to obtain Council approval.

Fiscal Impacts

Failure to approve the AAP in a timely manner could result in delays with drawing funds from HUD and delays in implementing projects listed in the AAP. Both the County and City of Champaign would also realize any delay in the availability of funds. The AAP must be in HUD's Chicago Office by May 17, 2002.

Staff would like to pursue a course of action that leads to approval at the May 6 City Council meeting.

Approval of the AAP and subsequent approval from HUD provides the City of Urbana with the following entitlement dollars:

\$539,000 CDBG funds \$395,730 HOME* funds *HOME program requires \$58,367 matching funds

Staff also recommends approval of the Draft Annual Action Plan, Version 2.5 with the added adjustments noted herein.

Such facility will accommodate an educational/meeting area to be located on the first floor and a transitional housing program on the second floor to serve 2-4 homeless families. Other funds contributed to this project include a \$100,000 grant from United

Parcel Service, and a contribution from the City of Champaign. While this project is located outside the City's CDBG jurisdiction, it is necessary to its community development and Consolidated Plan objectives. Transitional Housing for Homeless Families With Children (FY 02/03) Funds will be contributed to the City of Urbana's transitional housing program. Five dwellings are available for homeless families with children. Rent receipts will be another source of revenue. Properties acquired by the City through a federal funding source will be properly mowed and cleaned according to city ordinance as long as they are the responsibility of the City. \$40,274 (1,500 NG/38,774 RF) Specific Objective A-1 & C-1 [24 CFR 570.201(b)&(e)] EXEMPT

Public Service Activities under Consolidated Social Service Funding Program (FY 02/03) The balance of available funding @ 15% of current entitlement will be allocated for program activities yet to be determined which would benefit low-income residents of the CD Target Area. The renovated house will then be sold to a low- to moderate-income family.
