

RESOLUTION NO. 2017-01-001R

**RESOLUTION IN FAVOR OF FAIR AND SUSTAINABLE
FUNDING FOR 9-1-1 SYSTEMS**

WHEREAS, 9-1-1 systems throughout Illinois desperately need fair and sustainable funding, e.g., Champaign County voters approved \$1.50 per land line in 1998, which eroded with the adoption of cell phones and was cut to 87 cents by a state law expiring July 1, 2017; and

WHEREAS, the \$1.50 voters approved in 1998 would be \$2.50 today, inflation-adjusted; and

WHEREAS, the City of Chicago was allowed to have a \$2.50 fee imposed on land lines and cell phones alike (without a referendum) and current legislation allows Chicago to charge \$3.90 but limits all other 9-1-1 systems to 87 cents per phone, regardless of previous voter approval; and

WHEREAS, 9-1-1 fees throughout Illinois should reflect local needs and local dispatch systems should not be forced to rely more and more on cash-strapped local governments; and

WHEREAS, a fixed dollar (or cents) amount will erode in real terms by inflation over time; and

WHEREAS, a fee based on a small percent of the total bill has the advantage of keeping up with inflation and also is less regressive than a fixed dollar amount;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Urbana City Council supports the following:

1. 9-1-1 systems be allowed to charge a small percent of each monthly phone bill, depending on the local system's financial needs, and

2. In order to determine a reasonable percent, local 9-1-1 systems need to know the total number of phones being billed and the total amount of the bills in their geographic area. We ask that the Statewide 9-1-1 Advisory Board provide all local systems with this information and then consult with the local systems to craft new legislation before the current law expires July 1, 2017.


